Club Model Kits – Please read this By Bill W.

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IPMS Gator's has a "stash" of kits that we use as door prizes. This "give away" activity is a popular part of our meetings. Since 2015 we have given away over 150 kits as door prizes. In part, your yearly dues of \$20 supports this activity. The kits are purchased periodically to ensure a variety of kits are available as door prizes. Some kits have been donated to the club for use as door prizes.

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For at least 10 years, I have had 2 boxes of other unbuilt kits in my barn given to IPMS Gators by a former Regional Coordinator. Because of their complexity, these kits are not suitable for "make-and-takes." Over the years, the mud daubers have gotten into these boxes and left "their mark" [.. mud Θ].



Therefore, it's time to distribute these kits to the paid club members.



The most common kit that we have is the Roswell Ufo kit (see above) of which we have at least 20. The officers have decided to offer each paid club member one of these kits with the intent that the kit will be built for a "special" club contest to be held in April or May of this year (in addition to the usual monthly theme). If you want to participate and come to the January meeting, we will distribute a UFO kit to you at that time. If a member can't attend the meeting, we can hold a kit for them if they contact me (winter@pathology.ufl.edu) and request that a kit be held. The requests for kits are on a first come-first-serve basis until all of the kits have been distributed.

For the non-Roswell UFO kits (e.g., a Batcycle kit, a Batboat kit, the Independence Douglas C-118 Truman's Presidential Transport, F-117, F-14 and SR-71), these kits will be used as door prizes in addition to our regular 2 door prizes per month. There are approximately 12 such non-UFO kits. We will offer 3 per month so that these kits will be distributed over a 4-month period of time. For these kits, an additional 3 tickets will be drawn each month, and the winner can choose which of the non-Roswell kits they want (until the type of kit is exhausted).

Contact me if you have questions. In January, we will also be selling books donated to the club at a considerable discount.

Jeep

Most guys have a fantasy vehicle that they want for no good reason, just because it looks cool. Mine is a Jeep, like the one pictured to the right that I built for my cousin because he's a Jeep fanatic too. He was a Marine, so I had to do some research on the differences between Army and Marine Jeeps. The most basic is one I didn't have time to



do. Marine Jeeps were not painted Olive Drab for the most part, but a color called Marine Green. Since the AFV kit I built was molded in Olive Drab I went with that because I only had 3 days to build it. The kit was well molded and had lots of tiny, fragile parts that resulted in a detailed model that my cousin appreciated.



Other differences were related to markings. The Marines didn't plaster big white stars on their Jeeps like the Army did. They thought it made too easy a target. They also used yellow as the stencil marking color rather than white.



Jeep

I won't try to re-hash the history of the Jeep. It was the iconic vehicle of WW2 and frequently cited by Supreme Allied Commander Dwight Eisenhower as one of the most important pieces of equipment in the U.S. arsenal.

It was a classic example of how US industrial production won the war. American industry produced more than 650,000 Jeeps during the war. By contrast the Germans only made about 50,000 Kubelwagens. While the Nazi's were hauling equipment and soldiers around in horse-drawn wagons, the American forces were almost totally mechanized, thanks to the Jeep.



I still don't have a 1/1 scale Jeep of my own, so I'll have to be satisfied with this replica, but it's better than nothing.




I can still fantasize about driving on I-75 with a .50 caliber machine gun which I could use to administer vigilante justice to some

U.S. Interwar Years Colorful Aircraft (Brewster Buffalo)



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



What does road racing have to do with pre-WWII Nuremberg Party Rallies?

Leading up to WWII, Nazi Germany held political / ideological rallies in Nuremberg. The rallies became national events in 1933 after Hitler became chancellor on January 30 of that year. These massive rallies continued until 1938. The 1939 rally was canceled as Germany began WWII with its invasion of Poland on September 1.



The Nuremberg grandstand (Zeppelinhaupttribüne) in the Zeppelin Field is presently in disrepair.



The swastika atop the grandstand was destroyed by U.S. forces on 4-22-1945. Nuremberg had




fallen to the U.S. Army's 7th Army (Lieutenant General Alexander Patch), 45th (Major General Robert T. Frederick) and 3rd Infantry Divisions (Major General John W. O'Daniel) just 2 days previously. That attack had begun on April 16, 1945.

In 1967, the city blew up the grandstand's double row of pillars, causing severe damage to the remainder of the building. Not often noted is the presence of a hall within the grandstand.



What does road racing have to do with pre-WWII Nuremberg Party Rallies?

Since the end of WWII, as noted, the grandstand was partially demolished and is decaying. The roadway in front of the grandstand has been used for various types of racing since 1947. Initially for motorcycle racing, in the 1970's it became part of a sports car racing venue. Since 2000, it has been annually used by the *Deutsche Tourenwagen Masters*, the premier Germany-based touring car racing series. The Nuremberg street circuit is termed "Nurisring." Below is a diagram of the race course.



Since 1972 the race course has been set at 1.429 miles. The *Deutsche Tourenwagen Masters* sports car racing series is sanctioned by ADAC [*Allgemeiner Deutscher Automobil-Club* (literally: General German Automobile Club; Europe's largest automobile association)]. The series is based in Germany, with rounds elsewhere in Europe. The series currently races a modified version of Group GT3 grand touring cars.



Group GT3, known technically as Cup Grand Touring Cars (and commonly referred to as simply "GT3"), is a set of regulations maintained by the Fédération Internationale de l'Automobile (FIA). By 2013, nearly 20 automobile manufacturers had built or been represented with GT3 machines.

GT3 cars must be based on mass production road car models that are being built and sold at the time of testing and their certification. However, the engines need not meet these requirements. Performance of GT3 cars is regulated, either by the GT Bureau of the FIA or by a series' specific ruling body, through the balance of performance formulae that adjusts limits on horsepower, weight, engine management, and aerodynamics to prevent a single manufacturer from becoming dominant in the class. The GT3 weigh between 2645 lbs and 2866 lbs, with horsepower between 500 hp and 600 hp. GT3 cars also have traction control, ABS, and built-in air jacks for quick pit stops.

This membership includes six bimonthly issues of the IPMS Journal (now: "IUJ"; which is better than ever) and the opportunity to participate in the IPMS National Convention .




