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NPD Tour

Opening a time capsule is always a moment of high expectation. Imagine my surprise a few years ago when I found that an automotive time capsule existed just a few miles away in the *National Parts Depot* warehouse in Ocala. This collection is not open to the public, but club member and resident "car guy" Don Martin opened the door for me through his contacts as local president of the Antique Automobile Club.



Don arranged for our club to get a tour led by none other than the CEO of the company - Rick Schmidt



Rick's dad Jim Schmidt started the company in the basement of his home in Gainesville some 50 years ago, but the origins of his love for cars began when he bought and restored a 1928 Ford Model A Sport Coupe he found in a junkyard as a 14 year old boy. That car is prominently displayed in the collection. The NPD business of mail order restoration parts for classic cars thrived and provided Rick and Jim the wherewithal to start their collection, which has now grown to more the 200 cars. 4







In the beginning the focus was on classic Ford Thunderbirds from 1955-57, and there are several in the collection. It has since expanded to include many other makes and models, most notably the Mustang.

This example was rolled off the assembly line in 2003 as the 300 millionth car produced by Ford in its 100 year history.



Preserving historic cars in their original, unrestored condition is the primary goal of the collection according to Rick. A prime example of that philosophy is the 1941 Lincoln Continental they acquired with only 600 miles on the odometer.

Unlike a typical car show where you will see cars that have been heavily modified and rebuilt to suit the owner's taste, the NPD collection wants to preserve historic cars as they left the factory. 5





Not all are Fords, this 1953 Studebaker Starliner is widely recognized as one of the most beautiful designs of the era.





Some of the cars have an intriguing history. This 1956 Continental Mark 2 was once owned by William Clay Ford, the grandson of Henry Ford, who was the owner of the Detroit Lions and had the car re-painted blue to match the color of his team.



Almost every car in the collection has a story behind it. Time doesn't permit me to cover them all. Suffice it to say that if you like cars and get another chance to see the NPD collection you should take it.

As a thank you to our host the club presented this plaque to Rick for giving us a tour of his outstanding collection of cars.



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A note from Don Martin

I hope everyone who attended the NPD Tour enjoyed it. I thought Rick Schmidt did an admirable job answering our questions considering that he was in a bit of a time crunch because he had to pick his wife up at the airport.



About a year ago "*Old Cars*" magazine interviewed Rick concerning the state of the old car hobby and how NPD was meeting some of the challenges. I summarized the interview and presented it at an AACA



(Antique Automobile Club of America) meeting last January. I thought some of our folks might be interested in what he had to say. Here's an (even briefer) summary of the interview:

- 1. What is your role at NPD? I've been the Vice President and Chief Operating Officer since 1995.
- 2. What is your most popular parts catalog? We have more requests for our 1965 1973 Mustang catalog than any other.
- 3. Is there an upsurge of interest in any other of your parts catalogs? Absolutely Interest in Pickup trucks, particularly Ford and Chevy, has really ramped up.
- 4. Has your customer base changed over the last 25 30 years? Most of our customers are in the 40 70 years old bracket. The names may change, but that age demographic remains steady.
- 5. What was the greatest challenge NPD has had to overcome? I would say it was the transition to computerization in the 1980s.
- 6. What has been your greatest success? We've been able to hire great people who are interested in both the automobile industry and who care about customer service. Because of that we've been able to maintain a steady and current parts inventory and ship parts out in a timely manner.
- 7. Where do you see the greatest growth potential in the coming years? Pickup trucks, no question.
- 8. Are there any misconceptions you must deal with? Many people believe all automotive parts are made overseas. There are still many US parts manufacturers and we strive to do business with them.
- 9. What builds your business? Word of mouth and people searching our website.
- 10. Where will NPD be in 10 years? We expect a steady stream of business in the future.
- 11. At the end of the day, what car do you prefer to drive home? I enjoy driving a 60s muscle car, unrestored, a true survivor car.

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Frank Ahern's B-26 bomber "Flak-Bait'

A note on *Flak-Bait*: Flak-Bait is the Martin B-26 Marauder aircraft which holds the record within the United States Army Air Forces for the number of bombing missions survived during World War II. Flak-Bait was assigned to the 449th Bombardment Squadron, 322d Bombardment Group stationed in eastern England.

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During the course of its 202 (207 including its five decoy missions) bombing missions over Germany as well as the Netherlands, Belgium, and France, Flak-Bait lived up to its name by being shot with over 1,000 holes, returned twice on one engine (once with the disabled engine on fire), and lost its electrical system once and its hydraulic system twice. Despite the level of damage it received, none of Flak-Bait's crew was killed during the war and only one was injured.





The aircraft in question was built in Germany by Manfred Pflumm, the owner of the International Flugmuseum in Schwenningen. With a passion for aviation and a keen eye for detail, Pflumm dedicated many years to restoring and rebuilding airplanes for various museums. His






How to make your own airbrush holder for your paint booth

For our summer house in Ellijay, GA, I built an airbrush booth. One thing that I lacked was a holder for my airbrush itself. To answer this need, I built one out of 1 x 4 pine (...could have been spruce). Having written "1 x 4", it comes to mind that "1 x 4" is really ¾" by 3 ½." Kind of crazy...

I took a 12" piece of 1 x 4 and cut it into 3 pieces.




I then cut a notch into 2 of the boards that was ~1.5" by 1.5".




The third board was cut to ~1 1/4" in width to be used as as a spacer.

So that the pressure hose can exit from below the cutout, one corner of one of a notched board was cut off.



Next, the 3 boards were assembled together (I used wood glue and then nailed them together):



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
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To mount these 3 boards to the inside of the booth, I attached them to a 4th board indicated with the **red** arrow. As before, I initially attached this board with wood glue to the 3 other boards, Once the bond was stable, I used wood screws to hold this together,

For the short term, I've clamped the air brush holder to the upright wall of the booth (blue arrow). I also found that I needed to raise the holder about 4 to 5 inches so that there is plenty of room for hose to pass below the "holster."



Someday I'll bolt the holder to the wall of the booth and get rid of the clamp




Modeling Reality: How to Bail Out of a B-52

If you are one of a six-member B-52 crew, you would have an ejection seat. The two pilots (facing forward) , the electronic warfare officer (EWO) and gunner (both facing aft) would eject upwards. The navigator & radar NAV (facing forward in the lower deck) would eject downward. However, the current B-52 crew consists of five military personnel: pilot, co-pilot, navigator, weapons systems operator (WSO) and electronic warfare operator (EWO) (e.g., there is no "gunner"). In 2022 it was published that in the new B-52 configuration, two crew members would be able to act as navigator, EWO or WSO reducing the overall crew to 4.



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Modeling Reality: How to Bail Out of a B-52

While Bill had read about the downward ejection seats on the B-52, it wasn't until Bill saw an old movie (*"Bombers B-52"*) that he saw a short sequence depicting such a bailout. A series of screenshots depict what happens during this process.





In this photo (forward is to the left), the radar NAV's seat has moved back and down placing it in position for ejection. The navigator's seat has not moved.

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In this view looking aft, the radar NAV's seat begins to descend. The navigator's seat has still not moved.



Now we see that the escape hatches (doors) below the navigator and the radar NAV have been released and the radar NAV continues to be ejected down. GATOR (

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

In this photo we see the navigator ejecting downward.



Once the radar NAV and navigator have ejected out of the aircraft, other crew (if present) not in ejector seats can bail out through these "exits" (the open hatches).



I found this cartoon (left) on the web. Here are the abbreviations: Instructor Pilot (IP), Defense Instructor (DI), & Instructor Nav. (IN),

Note: B-52 ejection seats are **not** zero-zero (zero airspeed, zero altitude) ejection seats. In other words, they can't save the crew safely without some forward speed and altitude (source:




